To learn as we go and teach one another not just about Theta Delta Chi, but the entire Greek system. To build not just relationships, but the bonds of brotherhood in an atmosphere where know sense of brotherhood existed to begin with.

There has been no experience in my life that has been more indelible than the re-founding year of Epsilon Triton. I cannot remember a time where I saw young men come together and work to achieve a common goal of the same magnitude. A Psi Deut once asked me asked me.

How Does A Charge Get Started? Bryan Arnold, Director Of Expansion

Throughout my first year working for the Central Fraternity Office, one question that I have been asked over and over is 'why don't we have a charge at (insert school)'. This question comes from many different types of Theta Delts: alumni who want their charge back, recent grads that would like a charge near them, or undergraduates who want to visit another charge but there isn't one close. Whichever category you fall into, there are steps that can be taken to revitalize a charge.

Step 1: Tell the CFO! Contact Director of Expansion Bryan Arnold (barnold@tdx.org).

Step 2: Form an Alumni Support Group by working with TDX Headquarters Staff.

Step 3: This Support Group and TDX will begin to speak with school officials to schedule a return to the institution.

Step 4: After a timeline for return has been determined, the Alumni Support Group and TDX staff will work to plan an effectively organized expansion, which includes identifying a local Charge advisor and undergraduates to help start the interest group.

Step 5: Once the plan is in place, it will be implemented and recruitment for the colonization will begin.

Step 6: Upon completion of recruitment, the men must meet the Grand Lodge standards for colony status to be completed, which includes meeting the requirements for GPA, number of men, elected officers, and weekly meetings being held.

Step 7: The colony then will be supported by the Alumni Support Group, TDX staff, and the Charge Advisor until they are approved by the institution and the Grand Lodge for chartering.

All interested undergraduates and alumni are encouraged to contact the Theta Delta Chi International Headquarters. These steps take time and energy, but can be achieved if they are followed. Your charge or a school that you would like to expand to can be up and running in a short time. Most importantly, this can lead to somebody else having the opportunity of a lifetime, being a Theta Delt.

A Theta Delt Odyssey: From **Founding Father to NYC Networking**

With only 4,000 undergraduates and three fraternities on campus, there were very few options. 
